

The Good Samaritan is a story we all probably know well. In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus uses this story to teach us that it is our duty to look after the welfare of all those we encounter, regardless of social sta-



tus, ethnicity, or religion. We are called to care for the stranger. This is a message that we understand and strive to live out daily. But isn't it interesting that this man, an expert in religious law, even asks Jesus this seemingly obvious question - "Who is my neighbor?"

Our faith, and our community living experiences in particular, train us to look beyond borders and see all people as our neighbors. We understand that our well-being is hinged on their well-being. "Who is my neighbor" is probably not a question we often ask ourselves because we have learned to think globally. However, we can really relate to the man who asks Jesus this question. We know the correct answer to the question, but do we truly know who our neighbors are.

Many experiences could make us aware that the community we had created for ourselves was limited and restricted. We had constructed a false reality – one that was comprised of people just like us. How about others that are not like us? How about those we don't know on street corners? How about the suffering?

Questions for further reflection:

- What prevents you from being more connected to your neighbors?
- How does the parable of the Good Samaritan challenge you to be a loving presence to those who suffer?

Loving Your Neighbors

PRACTICAL TIPS

In Matthew 22:36-39, a Pharisee asked Jesus, "Teacher, which is the great commandment in the Law?" And Jesus said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Here are practical tips for loving your neighbor as yourself.

Seek Out Your Neighbor

In Ezekiel 34:16a, God says, *I will seek out the lost, and I will bring back the strayed.* God does this so many times through his flock.

Bless Those Who Persecute You

Yes, the ones who persecute you need Jesus more than ever. Romans 12:14 says, *bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them*. This is a reflection on Jesus's words in Matthew 5:44 when He says, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you.

Be Real

You just can't feel love from someone when they are doing something good for you because "it is the right thing to do". People feel love when it is really expressed. "I love you," is a very common phrase. Many times it just feels like it should be said. Really, though, it needs to come from the heart. Sometimes it is better to do something that says, "I love you" than saying it.

Sacrifice

With sacrifice comes remembrance. This is why Jesus instituted the "Lord's Supper". Luke 22:19 says, and He took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them (the 12 disciples), saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of Me."

Be a Good Listener

You will always feel like someone cares for you when they genuinely listen to you. Listening is a conscious choice you have to make. James 1:19 says, be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger.

Respect The Boundaries

You will not be seen as loving if you break into a person's home. You have not respected their boundaries. The same goes for the peripheral boundaries that each person has set for themselves. It is important that we as Christians can read the signs. To love like Christ is to be the salt of the earth (Matthew 5:13). Salt adds flavor and seasoning to food. We are to be like salt. People want flavor.

Feed The Good Wolf

There is an old Indian proverb about two wolves. It says that there are 2 wolves inside every person. One is full of evil wanting to kill, destroy and devour anything it can. The other is full of love wanting to look after the weak and take care of the less fortunate. The one that grows is the one you feed. The Christian's "good wolf" is the Holy Spirit. When we are feeding it by reading the Word, spending time in prayer and worshipping our Father, we will be fully equipped to let His light shine into the darkness and to love our fellow man in all circumstances.
